This little known cylinder, which had resided since 1879 in the British Museum, was the proclamation of the Achaemenian King Cyrus the Great at the time of his conquest of Babylon. The Achaemenians were followers of the Zoroastrian religion and it is a matter of pride and joy to FEZANA that this cylinder has brought recognition to the small but vibrant Zoroastrian community of North America. During the sojourn of the cylinder at the various museums, Washington D.C, Houston, New York, to date, FEZANA organized special commemorative public events which were well attended. These will now be followed by the exhibits in San Francisco, and Los Angeles.

FEZANA Administrative Office Marks Anniversary



In August, the FEZANA Administrative Office marks its fifth anniversary. The opening of the FEZANA Administrative Office in Burr Ridge, Illinois in August of 2008 under the leadership of Mr. Rustom Kevala, then FEZANA President, was a significant milestone in the history of FEZANA. It represents a step forward in the vision to establish а strona Zarathushti infrastructure North in America. Since then, the FEZANA Office has grown into an essential resource for FEZANA and its members. By serving as a "home base" for FEZANA, the FEZANA Office has often become a first point of access for many.

Currently, Zenobia Damania serves as the FEZANA Office Administrator. The FEZANA Administrative Office lends integral support to the FEZANA Executive Board and Committees in many ways.

From developing the *FEZANA Bulletins* to coordinating mailings for various committees to maintaining and facilitating communications to assisting the FEZANA Journal team, the Administrative Office has played an important role in the functioning of FEZANA.

Chicago to Celebrate Cyrus the Great's Contributions to Humanity

In 559 BCE, the Persian Emperor Cyrus the Great, overthrew the Medes, conquered the Lydians and the Babylonians and went on to build the greatest empire known up to that time – the first Great Persian Empire, the Achaemenid Empire. Unlike his contemporaries, Cyrus showed respect for the nations he conquered, and allowed them to govern themselves and follow their own religious beliefs – a tolerance very much in accordance with his Zoroastrian faith. The Old Testament hails Cyrus as a Messiah for freeing the Jews from captivity in Babylon and allowing them to rebuild their temples. These generous acts are recorded in cuneiform on the *Edict of Cyrus*, a clay cylinder discovered in 1879, which is acknowledged as the world's first declaration of human rights.

The original cylinder, which is housed at the British Museum, with a replica at the United Nations, is currently on a tour of five US cities with its next stop in San Francisco. Although Chicago is not one of the cities, the Zoroastrian Association of Chicago, FEZANA and the Oriental Institute, University of Chicago are collaborating to celebrate this gift to humanity, symbolizing multi-culturalism and respect for each other the world over.

The event will be held on **August 4**, **2013**, at the Zoroastrian Center of Chicago, in Burr Ridge, Illinois. Zoroastrian community members, members of the Oriental Institute and all interested persons are invited. A special invitation is extended to the Chicago interfaith community, members of the Council of Religious Leaders of Metropolitan Chicago (CRLMC) and associates of the Council for a Parliament of World's Religions (CPWR).

The program will include an unveiling of the replica of the Cyrus cylinder and poster board prepared by ZAC Children's Religion Education Class; remarks and presentations by speakers including: Matthew Stolper, Oriental Institute, University of Chicago; Margaret Cool Root, University of Michigan; and Rabbi Herman Schaalman, Chicago Board of Rabbis.

The Cyrus Cylinder, one of significant history's most obiects. arrives in San Francisco, on August 9, 2013 for the penultimate stop of its tour of the United States. It will be on display at the Asian Art Museum. 200 Larkin Street. San Francisco, CA till September 22, 2013.

The celebrations and the events begin even before the Cylinder reaches San Francisco.

and final resting place, Pasargadae (in present-day Iran).

August 9, 2013, Jay Xu, Director of the Asian Art Museum, moderates a panel discussion featuring scholars, historians, writers, and journalists in a conversation about the Cyrus Cylinder and its role in shaping the narrative of Iran, from ancient Persia to the present. UN Secretary-General's Countdown Message to Intl Day of Peace JUNE 13, 2013

Today we begin the 100-day countdown to the observance of the International Day of Peace, when the United Nations calls on all combatants around the world to lay down their arms and to give peace a real chance.

The International Day of Peace, marked on 21 September each year, offers an opportunity for the world to pause, reflect and consider how best to break the vicious cycle of violence that conflict creates.

The theme for the Day this year is "Education for Peace". The United Nations will examine the role education can play in fostering global citizenship. It is not enough to teach children how to read, write and count. Education has to cultivate mutual respect for others and the world in which we live, and help people forge more just, inclusive and peaceful societies.

This kind of education is a central focus of my Global Education First Initiative, which calls on governments to place education at the top of their agenda.

I call on everyone – whether governments, parties to conflicts, religious institutions, community leaders, the media, academics, or civil society groups – to play their part. We must support peace education programmes, protect students and teachers from conflict, help rebuild schools destroyed by war, and ensure all girls and boys have access to a quality education that includes learning about resolving and preventing conflicts.

Over the next 100 days, let us resolve to learn together how to create a universal culture of peace.

Return to Roots aims to provide youth living in the diaspora an opportunity to experience Zoroastrian India through short tours led by community experts and scholars. The main feature of the program is a short tour of Zoroastrian India where youth explore and discover their heritage while learning about their commonalities and the diversity that exists across the diaspora. Our long-term goal is to run these tours to Iran as well. We also aim to support local Zoroastrian communities and institutions within India as young Zoroastrians return to their roots and help revive the

community globally. The inaugural trip will be from 24 December 2013 to 6 January 2014 and will include attendance at the World Zoroastrian Congress in Mumbai.

We received applications from all over the world for the inaugural trip, with many of the strongest applications coming from North America. We are pleased to announce that fourteen North American youth will be joining us on the inaugural tour.

Once we complete the inaugural tour, we plan to announce new trips for 2014. We are planning to offer a special trip to Zoroastrian India for adults; we are designing a youth trip to India with a special focus on Zoroastrian culture; and we are also working towards designing youth trips for Iran.
